Women in Sports History



During Women's History Month, we'll be featuring a post each week from <u>America</u> <u>Comes Alive!</u> on little-known American women's history.

Kitty O'Neil (1947-) O'Neil was the first woman to be accepted into Stunts Unlimited (1976), an organization of

Hollywood's top stunt people.

O'Neil was an incredible athlete who swam competitively but then began to specialize in diving; she finished twelfth in the U.S. team trials for the Tokyo Olympics in 1964, but she contracted spinal meningitis which ended her Olympic dreams. She went on to race boats, cars, and motorcycles, setting many speed records. Several of her stunts also set records: In 1977 she completed the longest fall for a woman and the highest attempted fall while afire in a protective suit. O'Neil accomplished all this despite being totally deaf. She had suffered measles, mumps, and chicken pox at the age of four months, which caused profound hearing loss. Her mother was determined that Kitty would get an education and grow up normally, and she did that and more.
